Dear Chairmen Thune and Fischer and Ranking Members Nelson and Booker,

The undersigned associations want to thank you for your sponsorship of S. 3379, the Surface Transportation and Maritime Security Act (STMS Act), and urge you to report this legislation from the Commerce, Science & Transportation Committee before the end of the year.

We represent companies that are part of the nation's critical infrastructure that are engaged in security-sensitive operations. Among other things, our employees are subject to various vetting and credentialing requirements. Many of these requirements are overlapping and the redundant standards impose burdens that do nothing to improve the level of security.

There are a number of praiseworthy provisions in S. 3379. Of particular importance to us are the provisions in sections 19 and 21 of the bill. These provisions specifically address the issue of redundancy by allowing the "TWIC" (Transportation Worker Identification Credential) to satisfy vetting and credentialing requirements in other equivalent federal programs.

We do not want to lose the momentum from the introduction of this bipartisan bill. We request that you take whatever action is necessary to report this bill before the end of the year and we stand ready to work with you in support of the STMS Act and the vetting reforms in sections 19 and 21.
